"In my previous

occupations, the Lord helped open me up to speaking more freely in front of people," he says. "I never thought I would be in front of a classroom teaching anyone. I found out that I loved it! I am here now studying to be a pastor."

Both Brad and Adam are excited about their studies, but going to school and supporting young families isn't easy. Brad and his wife, Laura, have a son who's 7. Adam and his wife, Sarah, have three children, ages 9, 6, and 3.

"It has been a difficult journey for our family," says Adam. "It will always be a challenge to go to school, to work as much as possible, to pay the bills, to try and make ends meet. That's what makes the 'By Grace' Scholarship so special. It is a wonderful blessing to have the financial help. But it's an even greater blessing to simply know that people think about us, pray for us."

"This scholarship was especially meaningful for me last year," Brad

explains. "Last summer I was diagnosed with Stage 3b colon cancer. Over the course of the school year, I had two surgeries and six months of chemo treatments. I receive some funding from the GI Bill for school, but we are paying for the rest. This scholarship provided for a large portion of the remaining sum. It was an uncertain time for our family in many ways. But God provides, and in this case he provided by means of this scholarship."

'By Grace' is the name SOLA member Marilyn Miller chose for her scholarship, and it has proven apt. By grace Ms. Miller is able to provide these financial gifts, and by grace young men like Adam Lambrecht and Brad Price are able to pursue the pastoral ministry.

Adam speaks for both families when he quotes 1 Thessalonians 3:9 in a thank-you letter to Ms. Miller: "How can we thank God enough for you?"

## An Inside Look at MLC's New Minor in Urban Ministry

Benjamin Clemons *MLC '03* has an exciting challenge on his hands. He's a new professor called to develop a new minor at MLC: urban ministry. He's hardly new to this ministry, however, and we're excited to see how the Lord of the Church will use both his passion and expertise to inform the substance of the program.

Upon his MLC graduation 11 years ago, Ben was assigned to be principal of Risen Savior-Milwaukee. "It was the school's first year," he says, "and we started with about 50 children in K-3. We added a grade each year and poured our efforts into building a loving Christian culture."

By 2008, the school offered 4K-grade 7, and the enrollment had quadrupled. Then it was time for another kind of urban ministry—in Hangzhou, China, home to six million souls. He and his wife, Karyn (nee Vik) *MLC '03*, spent one wonderful year there: "We encountered many people who felt something was missing in their lives, but couldn't nail down just what it was. What a joy to share the most important message with them."

The couple was then called to teach at Mt. Lebanon-Milwaukee. Karyn taught first grade for a year, and Ben taught eighth grade for five years. "Again," he says, "we committed ourselves to creating a loving Christian culture and building a strong academic program."

It's not hard to see why our Lord might wind the Clemons ministry road from

Milwaukee to MLC. The college has had an urban ministry focus for a decade or so, but Ben will take it from focus to full-fledged minor. He began this summer, meeting with urban principals to assess needs and gather ideas. "There's a need for graduates with the skills, strategies, experience, and cultural competency to work in this rich harvest field," he says. "Our schools and churches have been in need of teachers—and even pastors who are willing, able, and excited to work in a setting drastically different from what most of us experienced growing up."

Now on campus, Professor Clemons is planning experiential opportunities—think everything from field trips to student teaching—and writing two courses, Intro to Urban Education Ministry and Advanced Teaching & Management Strategies, which will emphasize proven teaching practices undergirded by proper application of law and gospel.

The first course will be offered in 2015-16, enabling the class of 2018 to complete the minor from beginning to end.

Why is urban ministry important? "People live in cities," Ben says. "The demographic trend over the last two centuries has been movement from rural to urban. In places like Milwaukee, we have an established infrastructure of churches and schools that have shifted focus from the traditional middle-class German

family to the families in their surrounding neighborhoods, be they African-American, Hispanic, Hmong; rich or poor; longtime Americans or recent immigrants.

"Since we've had a longstanding tradition of strong education, it made sense to open our schools to our neighborhoods and begin training new generations in the Word."
