The women's basketball team earned its first win of the season by the score of 82-65 on November 21 against Finlandia at a tournament hosted by Wisconsin Lutheran College.

Five MLC players scored in double figures, led by a career-high 17 points from **Jade St. Germaine** (*LPS*) off the bench. St. Germaine also grabbed six rebounds and was named to the All-Tournament team.

Olson completed 51.2 percent of his passes for 1,207 yards and nine touchdowns, while also rushing for a team-best 861 yards and 13 touchdowns on 158 carries. Those rushing yards and touchdowns were good enough to place him inside the top

Olson finished his career atop several statistical categories at MLC. He set the new record for career rushing yards (2,720) and attempts (531), and also ranks second in career rushing touchdowns (33). His 13 touchdowns this season rank second among

conference's football postseason awards announced on November 18.

First-year point guard **T.J. Babinec** (*Luther*) is averaging 16.0 points per game, while **Josh Rathje** (*Little Rock AR*) is averaging 13.6 points per game and shooting 38.1 percent from beyond the three-point arc.
