You'll join other brothers who share your goal—the privilege of serving the Savior through a noble calling he himself established. And you'll encourage each other on this journey as you grow spiritually, mentally, emotionally, and socially.



The MLC Class of 2015: After graduation, you'll move on to the next leg of your journey at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary (WLS), where you'll do further in-depth study of Old and New Testament, doctrine, church history, liturgics, homiletics (preaching), teaching, Early Field Training in local congregations, and a vicar year in a congregation.

It's a long journey to the pulpit, but you won't be alone. WLS students will come back to MLC to encourage you in your college studies—and to enjoy some friendly competition on the court and field. And you'll travel to the seminary as well for special events like the Mission and Ministry Seminar.

One day you may be ordained and installed into the public ministry, like Rev. **Isaac Crass** *MLC '11, WLS '15 (right)*. Pastor Crass is a new instructor at MLC. His father, Rev. **Matthew Crass** *WLS '86* participated in Isaac's ordination.
