

Martin and Marie Janke: "MLC Is Part of Our Lives"



Supporting Martin Luther College with a legacy gift was a natural thing for Pastor Martin and Mrs. Marie Janke to do. The New Ulm ministerial school campus has always been a part of their lives.

Young Martin Janke and Marie Kappelmann both attended Dr. Martin Luther High School and had Martin's father, Professor Richard Janke, as a teacher. Martin went on to Northwestern College and Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, and Marie attended DMLC.

Marie's college education was abbreviated due to the severe teacher shortage in WELS. She didn't graduate with her class of '52 but took an emergency call to St. Paul's in Ixonia, Wisconsin, and taught five years there.

In 1955, Martin was assigned to St. John's in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he served with Pastor O.J. Naumann. Pastor Naumann was also WELS *President* Naumann, but the young marrieds knew him best as *Professor* Naumann, another of their DMLHS professors.

The Jankes subsequently served at St. Paul-Roscoe, South Dakota; Faith-Fond du Lac, Wisconsin; and David's Star-Jackson, Wisconsin. Four children—Paul, Lynne, James, and Karen—as well as hectic church and school schedules kept them busy.

Pastor Janke preached in both German and English, and this writer remembers his booming singing voice, which more than once prompted a little tyke in the pew to ask, "Is that God?"

Mrs. Janke taught kindergarten for many years, sometimes as a volunteer. Her first class at Faith-Fond du Lac included eight students, four of whom attended DMLC and are still teaching today.

Also noteworthy are the classes for special needs students the Jankes established beginning in the late 50s. The *Lutheran Educator* asked Marie to write about this rather new WELS educational movement. Fifty years later, MLC has a special education major for those who, like Marie, have a heart for God's children with special needs.

Three Janke children and nine grandchildren have attended MLC or its predecessors, Northwestern and Dr. Martin Luther College. But the Jankes are quick to point out that their

children and grandchildren who did not pursue the ministry are no less a blessing to God's church.

"MLC has been a part of our lives, our children's lives, and our grandchildren's lives," says Marie. "Therefore we want to support our synod's school."

She cites the many biblical encouragements to support the Lord's work, including David's words in Psalm 71 and after the temple offering in 1 Chronicles 29:

Since my youth, God, you have taught me, and to this day I declare your marvelous deeds. Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me, my God, till I declare your power to the next generation, your mighty acts to all who are to come (Psalm 71).

Lord our God, all this abundance that we have provided for building you a temple for your Holy Name comes from your hand, and all of it belongs to you (1 Chronicles 29).

Since 1995, the Jankes have lived in Slinger, Wisconsin, and continued their membership at David's Star, where Pastor Janke serves as visitation pastor.

we'd like them to be devoting all their thoughts and energy to their exciting new ministries.
