First, Dave Malnes, staff minister and founder of Praise and Proclaim Ministries, taught students a strategy for effective canvassing. Then they took to the streets on behalf of St. Paul's and St. John's churches here in New Ulm. Like **Josh Wordell** (*Shoreland / Bethany-Kenosha WI*) and **Faith Otte** (*NELHS / Bethel- York NE*), they knocked on doors, invited people to upcoming events, and proclaimed

the good news. They tallied up the number of times they got to plant gospel seeds as they described what our churches teach about God's love. In all, the participants planted 157 gospel seeds. Here's what students gained from the experience:

Jonas Landwehr (DSA / Divine Savior-Doral FL): "I realized how amazing it is that in this time and place we can publicly praise and proclaim Christ crucified. We're blessed. We can walk up to a stranger's house and tell them, 'I am a Christian. Here's what I believe.' However, this realization came with a humbling blow. Some people are risking their lives to spread the gospel, while here I am, afraid of a door slam or dirty look. God used this opportunity to help me become a more confident witness."

Austin Claffin (Southern Door HS-WI / Salem-Sturgeon Bay WI): "Usually when we think of outreach, we think of witnessing to people far away, forgetting the many souls in our own community who have an equal need for the message of the cross. This experience was a wonderful opportunity to see how God can use us to bring his saving gospel to our neighbors here in New Ulm."

I cannot wait to get out after receiving my first call and help my new congregation proclaim the Word in the community! The Praise and Proclaim experience was fantastic.
