Ms. Ruehrdanz's background in Spanish and her sudden need to come up with an English curriculum resulted in a somewhat eclectic classroom experience for her students. She seeks to reach beyond the norms of what you might expect in a high school English class. She uses literature as a tool to tackle difficult social and political issues and to explore how faith in Christ changes our outlook on life.

"Fiction is rooted in the human experience," she said. "We tell stories to connect with people—to give us a lens through which to catch a glimpse of their perspective. That's one thing I love about teaching English—I get to challenge students to see the world in a new way."

**Pastor JD Uhlhorn**, or "Tutor" as he's better known on campus, has a gift. I've met four awesome tutors at MLC. Each was a fantastic young pastor fresh out of the Sem with plenty to offer as an instructor and as a dorm supervisor.
