What he loves about drama at MLC: We all have the same purpose in mind as we work on these productions: using our God-given talents to glorify our Savior.

This show is especially cool... as it focuses on bringing a community together and loving one another, which is exactly what Christ calls us to do.

Learning empathy: As an actor, you really have to dig into your character's background, which gets you thinking about how other

people's experiences might differ from your own. This is an important aspect of ministry, as we'll one day minister to all people and have to understand their perspectives.

Forum wants you: Even if theatre isn't your jam, Forum is a great place to grow. Lots of people think of theatre as just an "on-stage" activity, but we need people behind the scenes—to build the set, make costumes, create props, and run the technical side of productions.
