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Two Kinds of Righteousness

In 1519, Martin Luther wrote one of his most famous sermons on Philippians 2:5-6. In that sermon, he wrote:

There are two kinds of Christian righteousness, just as man's sin is of two kinds. The first is alien righteousness, that is the righteousness of another, instilled from without. This is the righteousness of Christ by which he justifies though faith.

The second kind of righteousness is our proper righteousness, not because we alone work it, but because we work with that first and alien righteousness. This is that manner of life spent profitably in good works, in slaying the flesh and crucifying the desires with respect to the self, and in love to one's neighbor."

These two types of righteousness guide our worship theme in this Reformation Festival service: Righteous in Christ, Righteous through Christ.

Righteous in Christ

In your baptism, you have been clothed with Christ, as if he were something you could wear, and standing in him, he is your righteousness. As St. Paul explains, "In Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ" (Galatians 3:26-27). Luther's first type of righteousness describes that same point:

Through faith in Christ, therefore, Christ's righteousness becomes our righteousness and all that he has becomes ours; rather, he himself becomes ours.

Righteous through Christ

Through Christ Jesus, not only is his righteousness your own, but you are free to express that same righteousness he has given you through repentance and acts of love. St. Paul also writes: "For the grace of God has appeared that offers salvation to all people. It teaches us to say 'No' to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives in this present age" (Titus 2:11-12). Luther emphasizes the same:

This righteousness goes on to complete the first for it ever strives to do away with the old Adam and to destroy the body of sin. Therefore it hates itself and loves its neighbor; it does not seek its own good, but that of another, and in this its whole way of living consists.


May the Holy Spirit guide your thoughts today as we ponder these two types of righteousness—the kind which is from without, vicarious, and imputed; and the kind which is our own, worked, and demonstrated.

Call to Worship

- L: In the name of the Father, and of the Son (†), and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.
- L: I pray to you, Lord, in the time of your favor; in your great love, O God, answer me with your sure salvation.
- C: Answer me, Lord, out of the goodness of your love; in your great mercy turn to me.
- L: Do not hide your face from your servant; answer me quickly, for I am in trouble.
- C: Scorn has broken my heart and has left me helpless; I looked for sympathy, but there was none, for comforters, but I found none.
- L: Save me, O God, for the waters have come up to my neck.
- C: I sink into the dark depths, where there is no foothold.
- L: I have come into the deep waters; the floods engulf me.
- C: I am worn out calling for help; my throat is parched. My eyes fail, looking for my God.
- L: You, God, know my folly; my guilt is not hidden from you.

SELECTIONS FROM PSALM 69

Silence for self-examination and reflection on individual sins.

- L: But I pray to you, Lord, in the time of your favor; in your great love, O God, answer me with your sure salvation.
- C: Rescue me from the depths, do not let me sink; deliver me from the deep waters.
- L: O Lord, hear my contrition and confession:
- C: I confess to you, God Almighty, before the whole company of heaven, and to you, my brothers and sisters, that I have sinned in thought, word, and deed; in what I have done and in what I have failed to do, by my fault, by my own fault, by my most grievous fault; I cannot provide my own righteousness or earn my own salvation, so now I pray God Almighty to have mercy on me, forgive me all my sins, and bring me to everlasting life. Amen.
- L: The Lord your God is merciful and has sent his only Son to save you from your sins. He is the Servant of the Lord, who earned for you salvation by his righteousness. In Christ, his righteousness has become your own, "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" 1 CORINTHIANS 5:21. Therefore, I declare to you that your sins are forgiven in the name of the Father, and of the Son (†), and of the Holy Spirit!



L: Come, let us sing to the Lord a song of praise:

Prayer of the Day

L: Let us pray:

O God, you have prepared for those who love you joys beyond understanding. Work in our hearts and minds a knowledge of your righteousness, that has been given to us in your Son Jesus Christ, so that we are counted as righteous before you, that we desire the end of sin within us, and that we may go out to love our neighbors. Pour into our hearts such love for you that, loving you above all things, we may obtain all your promises, through Jesus Christ, your Son and our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C: Amen.



First Lesson—Isaiah 52:13-53:12

The quintessential text that shows Christ suffering vicariously and earning our righteousness.

¹³ See, my servant will act wisely; he will be raised and lifted up and highly exalted. ¹⁴ Just as there were many who were appalled at him—his appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any human being and his form marred beyond human likeness—¹⁵ so he will sprinkle many nations, and kings will shut their mouths because of him. For what they were not told, they will see, and what they have not heard, they will understand.

¹Who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? ²He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground. He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. ³He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain. Like one from whom people hide their faces he was despised, and we held him in low esteem.

⁴ Surely he took up our pain and bore our suffering, yet we considered him punished by God, stricken by him, and afflicted. ⁵ But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed. ⁶ We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to our own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

⁷He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. ⁸By oppression and judgment he was taken away. Yet who of his generation protested? For he was cut off from the land of the living; for the transgression of my people he was punished. ⁹He was assigned a grave with the wicked, and with the rich in his death, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth.


¹⁰ Yet it was the LORD's will to crush him and cause him to suffer, and though the LORD makes his life an offering for sin, he will see his offspring and prolong his days, and the will of the LORD will prosper in his hand. ¹¹ After he has suffered, he will see the light of life and be satisfied; by his knowledge my righteous servant will justify many, and he will bear their iniquities. ¹² Therefore I will give him a portion among the great, and he will divide the spoils with the strong, because he poured out his life unto death, and was numbered with the transgressors. For he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

L: This is the Word of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God!

Psalm of the Day—Psalm 46

The cantor/choir sings the refrain. All repeat the refrain and sing it as indicated.



The cantor/choir sings the verses of the psalm.

God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging.

There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy place where the Most High dwells.

Come and see what the LORD has done, the desolations he has brought on the earth. He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth. Second Lesson—Philippians 2:5-11

Luther used this pericope when preaching on the two kinds of righteousness. Both are clearly visible in Paul's words here.

- ⁵ In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:
- ⁶Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; ⁷ rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. ⁸ And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross! ⁹ Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.
- L: This is the Word of the Lord.
- C: Thanks be to God!

Verse of the Day—Mark 10:45

- L: The verse of the day is from Saint Mark, chapter ten, verse 45.
- C: Alleluia! For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. Alleluia!

The Gospel—Mark 10:35-45

Those in Christ live differently than those in the world, and Jesus teaches us why.

³⁵ Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to him. "Teacher," they said, "we want you to do for us whatever we ask." ³⁶ "What do you want me to do for you?" he asked. ³⁷ They replied, "Let one of us sit at your right and the other at your left in your glory." ³⁸ "You don't know what you are asking," Jesus said. "Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with?"

³⁹ "We can," they answered. Jesus said to them, "You will drink the cup I drink and be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with, ⁴⁰ but to sit at my right or left is not for me to grant. These places belong to those for whom they have been prepared." ⁴¹ When the ten heard about this, they became indignant with James and John. ⁴² Jesus called them together and said, "You know that those who are regarded as rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. ⁴³ Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴ and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. ⁴⁵ For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."



Sermon—Mark 10:35-45

"Christ Alone!"

Confession of Faith—The Solid Declaration of the Formula of Concord III:32

It is indeed correct to say that believers who through faith in Christ have been justified possess in this life, first, the reckoned righteousness of faith and, second, also the righteousness of the new obedience or of good works. But these two dare not be confused with one another or introduced simultaneously into the article of justification by faith before God. For because this new righteousness or renewal in us is imperfect and impure in this life on account of the flesh, no one can therewith and thereby stand before the judgment of God. Only the righteousness of the obedience, passion, and death of Christ which is reckoned to faith can stand before God's judgment. Hence even after his renewal, after he has done many good works and leads the best kind of life, a person is pleasing and acceptable to God and is adopted to sonship and the inheritance of eternal life only on account of Christ's obedience.

L: Suppress Satan's power when he tries to tempt us. If at first we listen to his voice, give us wisdom to detect his trickery and strength to overcome him.

C: But deliver us from evil.

L: Shield us from harm. When we do face adversity and endure trouble, help us to carry our burdens with patience and trust, knowing that you work out all things for our good. Finally, when our last hour comes, take us to our home in heaven.

Hear us, Lord, as we bring you our private petitions.

Silence for private prayers to the Lord and Savior.

L: You alone, O Father, are the eternal King from whom we seek help. You alone have the power to grant our desires. You alone have the glory now and in eternity for all you have done. With confidence and trust we say:

C: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.

L: The Lord bless you and keep you.

The Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you.

The Lord look on you with favor and give you (†) peace.

C: Amen.
