The Martin Luther College Choir is an auditioned choir representing the various education programs offered at MLC.

The choir rehearses five times a week to prepare a program of choral music to take to various areas of the WELS. In recent years the choir has sung at congregations in Alaska, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, North Dakota, South Dakota, Colorado, New Mexico, Tennessee, Texas, Arizona, California, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. The choir was also privileged to travel to our missions in Mexico in 2008.

In addition to this choir, Martin Luther College has other opportunities for students to participate in ensemble performance. We have three other choirs: Männerchor, Women's Choir, and Chorale. In the instrumental area, we have a Wind Symphony and the Hosanna Ringers. These ensembles are open to all students, and entry is via an audition process.

His professional work experience includes service as a classroom teacher, school and church music director, and minister of music. Adrian has been a presenter and clinician at various choral, organ, and handbell workshops, regional and national WELS handbell festivals, and elementary and secondary choral festivals. He is an active member of the American Choral Directors

Association and the National Association for Music Education and served on the psalmody committee for the WELS Hymnal Project. Adrian currently serves as professor of music at Martin Luther College, where he conducts the College Choir and Männerchor and teaches courses in Lutheran Worship and choral conducting.

The anthem *We wait for thy loving kindness, O God* was written for the marriage of H R H The Princess Elizabeth and Lieutenant Philip Mountbatten in Westminster Abbey, November 20, 1947. Following a brief organ intonation, a tenor soloist chants the opening phrase of Psalm 48, followed by a series of a cappella "alleluias" sung by the SATB chorus. The chorus continues the text of Psalm 48 accompanied by organ, culminating in a final, triumphant "alleluia."

This setting combines the Zimbabwe hymn "Uyai Mose" for SATB choir and percussion, the polyphonic setting of the chorale "Lobe den Herren" by Hugo Distler, and stanzas of the hymn "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty" accompanied by brass and organ, allowing for congregation participation. These texts and tunes from around the world remind us that God's people of every time and place join with us in praise of God's constancy towards us and all creation.

Antiphon (Spiritual Songs)

text by: George Herbert Kenneth Jennings

Antiphon is the seventh of eight *Spiritual Songs* by Kenneth Jennings. The text is written by George Herbert (1593-1633) who wrote devotional poetry throughout his life. The musical setting follows the design of the poem. The repeated antiphon is set to the same music with a few alterations at cadence points. The music of the verse sections has been adapted from Thomas Tallis's *Festal Psalm for Christmas*, one of the earliest examples of harmonized chant.

Commissioned by the Dale Warland Singers, *We Gather Together* features the hymn tune KREMSER, a Dutch folk song published in 1626. Paulus sets the three stanzas of this song of thanksgiving for eight-part a cappella chorus.

We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing; He chastens and hastens his will to make known; The wicked oppressing now cease from distressing: Sing praises to his name; He forgets not his own.

This work was composed in 1758 during Telemann's last creative period. In it he strived for a simpler technique. Although written in a Baroque idiom, its style points already to the classic period.

Jean Berger (1909-2002) was a German-born American pianist, composer, and music educator. His compositional style is described as accessible but always fresh, and his vocal writing displays a masterful sensitivity to the rhythms and emotions of the text. *Alleluia* is the concluding portion of Berger's longer work, *Brazilian Psalm – Psalmo Brasileiro* (1940). Using South American samba rhythms, Berger sets a text by Jorge de Lima with an ever-present repetition of the word "alleluia."

This genre-bending piece (blending elements of rock, gospel, spiritual, and spoken word) recalls iconic stories of rescue and promise in the Old Testament, and invites the listener to imagine a world of mercy, justice, peace, and compassion.

Chantez à Dieu Chanson Nouvelle (Sing to the Lord a New Song)

Psalm 96 Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck

Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck (1562-1621), a Dutch composer, was known primarily as an organist, in which capacity he served at the *Oude Kerk* in Amsterdam for 44 years, and as a composer of works for keyboard. He also wrote over 250 works for choirs, mostly psalm settings, including *Chantez à Dieu*, which appears in his fourth and final book of psalm settings, published in 1621 shortly after his death. Sweelinck is considered a transitional composer, composing in both late Renaissance and early Baroque styles. *Chantez à Dieu*, based on Psalm 96 as found in the Genevan Psalter and so in French, is written for SATB chorus and features imitative polyphony as each voice sings and repeats musical phrases of the psalm.

Carol Barnett, a graduate of the University of Minnesota, served as composer in residence with the Dale Warland Singers from 1992-2001, and taught composition at Augsburg College from 2000-2015. *The World Beloved: A Bluegrass Mass* was commissioned by Mike and Kay McCarthy to be performed by the VocalEssence Ensemble Singers and Monroe Crossing, a bluegrass ensemble. About this work Barnett writes:

Composing the music for *The World Beloved* has given me the chance to write cheery sacred music – all too rare in a medium rife with staid and even lugubrious settings. It's brought me back to memories of music heard while visiting my grandparents: country music with a church flavor that told stories and came out of a scratchy old record player.

The Sanctus from her Bluegrass Mass captures these qualities in her joyful setting.

Agnus Dei (Lamb of God)

from Kleine Orgelmesse, Mass no. 7 in B-flat Major

Franz Joseph Haydn (1732-1809) was an Austrian composer of the Classical period. Haydn's *Kleine Orgelmesse* (Little Organ Mass) was composed during the first period of his three Esterhazy appointments. It was composed for a very small chapel with limited space and was called "little organ mass" due to its abbreviated length of eighteen minutes and its extended organ solo. The *Agnus Dei*, composed in a classical style, features dramatic dynamic contrast between the words "Lamb of God" and "Give us peace."

Drauf schliess is the final movement of Bach's double-chorus funeral motet, *Komm, Jesu, Komm* (Come, Jesus, Come). While rather chorale-like, it is not based on a traditional chorale. This movement is an aria in four-part harmony to the words "Drauf schliess ich mich in deine Hände" (Therefore, I enclose myself in your hands.) Its message of comfort, based on elements of John 14:6, announces that "Jesus is, and remains, the true way to Life."
