NUN IST DAS HEIL UND DIE KRAFT, BWV 50

Revelation 12:10 J. S. Bach (1685-1750)

Then I heard a loud voice in heaven say:

"Now have come the salvation and the power and the kingdom of our God, and the authority of his Messiah.

For the accuser of our brothers and sisters, who accuses them before our God day and night, has been hurled down. (Revelation 12:10)

J. S. Bach sets a paraphrase of Revelation 12:10 in BWV 50, Nun ist das Heil und die Kraft, as an impressive choral work composed for the Festival of St. Michael and All Angels. In a single, compact movement of less than five minutes, Bach draws on two vocal and three instrumental choirs (of trumpets, oboes, and strings) to encapsulate the victory celebrations of the forces of Light through use of a permutation fugue, with subjects and countersubjects rearranged in various orders. One only has to think of the "Sanctus" in the B minor Mass to realize that Bach embraced and relished the musical imagery of the Book of Revelation and the concept of the angelic hosts. The musical complexities of this work are enhanced by the special effect of one choir pitted against the rest. Musicologist Klaus Stein explains these features as products of Bach's imaginative response to the text: the words from Revelation being spoken by a 'loud voice' in heaven, and Bach returning them from earth in echoing assent. This performance by the Martin Luther College Choir features both vocal choirs, a string bass, and a piano reduction of the original orchestration.





FANTASY ON AMERICAN THEMES

BEACH SPRING

This musical offering features adaptations of three traditional American hymn tunes. The lyrical folk melody "Land of Rest," in triple meter, opens the work and is followed by original material that leads to the second tune, "Holy Manna," from *The Southern Harmony*, 1835. Taken at a lively tempo, this second melody takes on the qualities of a fiddling tune. The third tune, "Beach Spring," first appeared in print in the 1844 edition of *The Sacred Harp*, an American tune book. *Christian Worship* 2021 features this melody in hymn 517, "Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness." The words of this hymn are fitting for a concert with the theme "Piercing the Darkness," as the author wrote of his text: "It is astounding how much Jesus did in such a brief earthly ministry, yet more astounding is how God's blessing and saving acts continue on through Christ. How can we do other than to praise this Light in the darkness?"

CHICHESTER PSALMS, MOVEMENT 1

Psalm 108:2, Psalm 100 Leonard Bernstein (1918-1990)

In the early 1960s, Leonard Bernstein was at the height of his career. West Side Story, the 1961 film version of his 1957 Broadway musical, was widely and enthusiastically received, and he had recently completed his "Kaddish" Symphony No.3. It was around this time that he received a commission from Walter Hussey, who was then the dean of Chichester Cathedral in the south of England. Each year the choirs of Chichester, Winchester, and Salisbury cathedrals joined together to produce a music festival. Bernstein was commissioned to write a new work for the festival of 1965, and *Chichester Psalms* was completed on May 7 of that year.

Chichester Psalms was originally written for boy treble or countertenor, solo quartet, choir, and an orchestra that included two harps, three trumpets, three trombones, and extensive percussion. The work was premiered on July 15, 1965, in New York's Philharmonic Hall, featuring the Camerata Singers and the New York Philharmonic, conducted by the composer. Just over two weeks later, on July 31, it was performed in Chichester Cathedral with all-male singers, as Bernstein originally intended, conducted by the cathedral organist, John Birch. The version we hear today was made by Bernstein in 1966 and calls for organ, one harp, and percussion.

The first movement begins with the call to the instruments, psaltery and harp, to wake up and be ready to perform, in the words of Psalm 108:2. It is a somewhat rude awakening that grows in intensity, with the dissonant parallel sevenths of the tenors and basses underneath the unison sopranos and altos. Now awake, the chorus launches into an almost carefree, jaunty setting of Psalm 100 in 7/4 meter. But the psalm ends in quiet tranquility, with *Ki tov Adonai* (the Lord is good) sung first by the soloists and then by the choir, whose final syllable is supported by the seventh chord that was the characteristic of the wake-up call at the beginning of the movement.

MITZVAH

Mark 12:28-31, Micah 6:8 Eric William Barnum (b. 1979)

Mitzvah was commissioned specifically for the Northwestern Choir under the direction of Timothy Sawyer in celebration of Dr. Alan S. Cureton's fifteenth year as president of the University of Northwestern—St. Paul. A gift from Dr. Cureton's family, it was presented to him by his wife, Gayle, and the Cureton family to celebrate his commitment to the institution. This piece was composed by Dr. Eric Barnum (b. 1979), a Minnesota native and nationally-known conductor and composer.

Titled with the Hebrew word meaning "commandment," *Mitzvah* is memorable in that it is based on two of Dr. Cureton's favorite Bible passages, Mark 12:28-31 and Micah 6:8, set to music in a unique and innovative way. Listen carefully to the way in which Dr. Barnum uses text painting, repeated elements, and tempos to bring to life the ancient words of Scripture. Especially notable at the beginning of the piece is the repetition of the phrase "The Lord is one," which, as the composer notes, is meant to allude to the triune nature of God.

This a cappella work by Romanian-born Hungarian composer György Orbán is based on an anonymous medieval text. The composer uses several musical devices—including minor seconds, augmented chords, and chromatic scales—to depict the artifice and deceptions of the devil.

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The Martin Luther College Choir is an auditioned choir representing the various education programs offered at MLC.

The choir rehearses five times a week to prepare a program of choral music to take to various areas of the WELS. In recent years the choir has sung at congregations in Alaska, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, North Dakota, South Dakota, Colorado, New Mexico, Tennessee, Texas, Arizona, California, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. The choir was also privileged to travel to our missions in Mexico in 2008.

In addition to this choir, Martin Luther College has other opportunities for students to participate in ensemble performance. We have three other choirs: Männerchor, Women's Choir, and Chorale. In the instrumental area, we have a Wind Symphony and the Hosanna Ringers. These ensembles are open to all students, and entry is via an audition process.
